

Letter to Mayors re. Bill 185 and New Provincial Planning Statement

May 22, 2024

Dear Mayors and Councils in York Region,

As you are aware, planning policy has been transformed in Ontario. We are concerned that, along with inadequate funding and lack of support for both affordable housing and environmental protection, that these changes will severely reduce people's quality of life in Ontario, while increasing the cost of living.

We presume that staff from most lower-tier municipalities have analyzed Bill 185 and the new PPS, and made recommendations to support/not support/consult further on different aspects. This letter will not repeat these numerous recommendations, but describe broader themes.

You have responsibilities to plan for housing for people of all income levels. There are 14,000 in York Region alone on social housing waitlists. In York Region in particular, where existing low density development already taxes residents' pocketbooks with high infrastructure servicing costs, the proposed changes would have severe implications.

The proposed changes to public participation and planning decision appeals in Bill 185 are undemocratic; they will reduce any public appetite for engaging in government and planning our futures. This is caustic and will absolutely lead to worse communities. Largely that is because developers are allowed to appeal a much greater range of decisions than the public, municipalities or regions. We would be **embracing developer-led planning**, which we have been trying to remedy in Ontario since 2005 with the Growth Plan.

The loss of the Growth Plan in its entirety is shocking, largely because so few policies have been carried over to the Provincial Planning Statement. There is no more requirement to have an agricultural or a Natural Heritage System layer mapped in Official Plans. It is just a recommendation. With developer-led planning and limited appeals we are concerned that an NHS will be weak and ineffective.

Further, we have <u>no more density or intensification requirements</u> except at Major Transit Station Areas, MTSAs. This will have the effect of ghettoizing lower income people rather than integrating people of all incomes in our existing neighbourhoods. As the municipal comprehensive review process highlighted, the infrastructure cost of sprawl is massive. As well, more roads means more salt, and we already have major salt pollution problems in York Region's rivers, some aquifers, and Lake Simcoe. It is imperative that we retain intensification and density requirements, for both environmental and cost sustainability.

There are a large number of concerns and questions around policy, coordination and implementation. Here are some brief points on items that have received less visibility, namely water/waste water and energy supply:

- We are astonished at the idea of putting municipalities in charge of water and sewer allocations without regional planning. How on earth can that be done in a sustainable way without a larger body like the province or the region facilitating decision-making? Who makes sure the environment is protected? Is anyone looking at cumulative water taking or cumulative loads of pollution?
- Expansion of private sewage services is a huge mistake that will have catastrophic water quality impacts. (PPS 2024 S 3.6.2, 3, & 4)
- The loss of key growth plan policies around ensuring assimilative capacity for sewage and water services and stormwater management will have long-term adverse health and environmental consequences.
- There is no justification for removing climate from the stormwater management provisions given that heavy rainfall events are key to stormwater management planning.
- There is no forward thinking involved in emissions reductions or energy efficiency for new builds that would increase affordability and improve health. Enbridge has continued authority to run soon obsolete pipelines to urban sprawl with the consumer and taxpayers holding the tab for the next forty years. The Ontario Energy Board provided alternatives that have been ignored and again, an attempt is being made to circumvent due diligence oversight (Bill 165)
- Watershed planning was previously the purview of Conservation Authorities. We have no faith that municipalities can lead watershed planning, and there appears to be no coordination or implementation plan that would make this possible. Watershed planning needs to be mandatory and done by Conservation Authorities.

What can be done?

We urge you to resist these changes, and to support York Region's staff comments to the Province, especially the need to require close coordination of planning and implementation of Regional infrastructure and services. It is necessary to align growth with Regional infrastructure. The Region report highlights such areas as

- Coordination of modification of Ministry of Finance population forecasts through OPs
- Coordination of urban boundary expansions and employment conversions that can occur outside of a comprehensive review
- Coordination of local determination of intensification and density targets.

We very strongly encourage everyone to do their part to increase the provision of rental and affordable housing in every municipality.

We urge you to push back on, at the very least, those elements of the policy changes that are environmentally and financially unsustainable.

Questions for Chair Emmerson

- As we lose regional representation in planning matters, how is democracy being upheld? As the roles and responsibilities of regional council are changing, what does this mean for representation at local governments, and are you satisfied that the public is being represented fairly? The province has ordered a review of regional governments. Is political representation at the regional level also part of that review?
- The water / wastewater Capital Plan is \$4.4 BILLION over the next ten years. How are decisions being made about priority and per capita cost and ongoing maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure? York Region Staff and ENGOs have been flagging this as a significant item since the Municipal Comprehensive Review began. In the absence of regional planning and phasing policies, how can efficiency be accomplished?

For instance, YR Committee of the Whole, May 09, 2024, Stouffville Mayor Lovatt asks about speeding up delivery of water infrastructure for development in Stouffville and Markham that requires servicing. It appears that Council is contemplating development through MZOs and other mechanisms that clearly do not yet have servicing, or money to build the infrastructure. There were no big picture questions in response to the staff presentation. Council continues to appear to be representing developers interests and not seriously questioning the costs, impacts and phasing of development proposals.

• The Ontario Human Rights Tribunal has already served Aurora, York Housing and York Region with a reprimand for not referring a proposal for transitional and shelter housing in Aurora to the next level, and commented on the discriminatory nature of public comments about the proposed project and its users. The letter reminds its recipients of their obligations under the Ontario Human Rights code, the PPS and York's own Official Plan. So, how is YR going to provide social housing, transitional housing and affordable housing? There is clearly an urgent need, and instead of spending scarce resources on housing all people, the region is focused on servicing huge houses in greenfields, to the detriment of the environment, and fiscal sustainability.

Please be advised that at their meeting held on May 8, 2024, Council for the Town of Georgina passed the following resolution:

WHEREAS home heating energy costs is a major and onerous burden for Seniors and those with limited or fixed incomes;

AND WHEREAS the cost of natural gas to heat homes continues to climb due to many factors such as inflation, delivery and customer charges, carbon tax, among others, causing financial strain for many citizens;

AND WHEREAS Canadians have no choice but to heat their homes throughout the winter;

AND WHEREAS no citizen should have to choose between putting food on the table or heating their homes;

AND WHEREAS the carbon tax is increasing as of April 1, 2024 to \$0.15 per cubic meter for natural gas, and the carbon tax rebate for homeowners is also increasing;

AND WHEREAS Ontario homeowners can now expect to receive \$1,120 annually for the rebate on average and the rebate will be renamed to the Canada Carbon Rebate;





Please be advised that at the Township of Pelee's Regular Meeting of Council held on May 28th, 2024, the following resolution was passed:

WHEREAS the Provincial Policy Statement (PPS) (Section 1.6.6.2) states that municipal sewage services and municipal water services are the preferred form of servicing for settlement areas to support protection of the environment and minimize potential risks to human health and safety and that intensification and redevelopment within these settlement areas should be promoted; and

WHEREAS the PPS (Section 2.2.1 (f)) states that planning authorities shall protect, improve, or restore the quality and quantity of water by implementing the necessary restrictions on development and site alternation to protect all drinking supplies and designated vulnerable areas, and protect, improve, or restore vulnerable surface and ground water, sensitive surface water features and sensitive groundwater features, and their hydrologic functions; and

WHEREAS the PPS (Sections 2.2.l(h) and (i)) states that there is consideration of environmental lake capacity as well as stormwater management practices; and

WHEREAS the Ministry of the Environment, Protection and Conservation (MECP) Procedural Guideline B-1-5 Policy 2 provision states that water quality which presently does not meet the Provincial Water Quality Objectives shall not be further degraded and all practical measures shall be undertaken to upgrade the water quality to the Objectives;



and

WHEREAS in 2014 the Township of Whitewater Region authorized Jp2gConsultants Inc. to undertake a Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (EA) for the purpose of evaluating viable options to upgrade the 1979 Cobden Wastewater Treatment Plant. This plant did not meet guidelines for effluent flow into Muskrat Lake and Cobden Wetland being highly sensitive, atcapacity, inland lake, and Provincial Significant Wetland (PSW) and acknowledged as one of the most eutrophic in the province. The plant had ongoing seasonal overflow events, and was operating at maximum capacity; and

WHEREAS in 2018 the Council of the Township of Whitewater Region approved the construction of a new parallel mechanical system that would meet all provincial environmental and regulatory requirements including accommodating future growth. Federal and provincial contributions only covered 50% of the final construction costs, as there was no ability to renegotiate with federal and provincial partners once real costs were known. As a result, the balance of costs (\$6M) was debentured over 30 years at interest rates that are slightly punitive to rural and small urban municipalities; and

WHEREAS in 2019 the Council of the Township of Whitewater Region conducted a Water and Wastewater Rate Study that demonstrated the need for rate increases of over 100% to fund the new wastewater treatment plant construction debenture and the significantly increased operating costs for a parallel mechanical system. Rural and small urban municipalities experience very limited growth as federal and provincial policies heavily support growth in urban centers. As there are no other sources of available operational funding, rural and small urban municipalities are expected to fund the construction and operation of these state-of-the- art systems from existing property owners and nominal forecasted growth; and

WHEREAS in 2023 the Township of Whitewater Region combined water and wastewater rates have risen to almost \$3,000/year for its five hundred and eleven (511) users and are among the highest in the County of Renfrew and across the Province of Ontario. There are similarly high user rates in the Township of Madawaska Valley as a result of Provincial regulations and a small number of users. Other examples of rapidly increasing rates include the Towns of Deep River, Renfrew, Arnprior, Laurentian Hills, and Petawawa, and the Townships of Bonnechere Valley, Laurentian Valley and Killaloe, Hagarty and Richards, where significant upgrades in short periods of time are making rates unaffordable even with an increased number of users.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Council of the Township of Pelee support the County of Renfrew's resolution to:



Advocate to the provincial and federal levels of government to make them aware that rural and small urban water and wastewater systems are financially unsustainable; and Advocate to the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO), the Rural Ontario Municipalities Association (ROMA) and the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) to examine if the unaffordability of water and wastewater system operational costs is systemic provincially and nationally.

AND THAT a copy of this resolution be circulated to The Honourable Doug Ford, Premier of Ontario; the Honourable Kinga Surma, Minister of Infrastructure (Ontario); the Honourable Dominic LeBlanc, Minister of Intergovernmental Affairs, Infrastructure and Communities (Canada); the Honourable Paul Calandra, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, the Honourable Andrea Khanjin, Minister of the Environment, Conservation and Parks (Ontario), Dave Epp, MP, Chatham-Kent-Leamington; Trevor Jones, MPP, Chatham-Kent-Leamington; AMO; ROMA; FCM; and all Municipalities in Ontario.
