For your information and records, at its electronic meeting held on June 7, 2022 the Council of the Town of East Gwillimbury enacted as follows:

WHEREAS the Town of East Gwillimbury is Canada's fastest growing municipality (with more than 5,000 residents) according to 2021 Census Canada data; and

WHEREAS the Council of the Town of East Gwillimbury has significant concerns regarding the impact of Bill 109 on the community planning process, and the ability of municipalities to deliver on initiatives to address housing supply and attainability, and

WHEREAS the refund provisions in Bill 109 will result in existing taxpayers subsidizing development applications as well as lost revenue and increased staff costs for municipalities; and

WHEREAS the prescription of what constitutes a complete application does not address differing levels of complexities and the unique circumstances and diverse landforms that exist across the province, nor does it recognize the collaborative process and relationships between parties that deliver results for municipalities; and

WHEREAS limiting conditions on Draft Plan of Subdivision does not address the unusual and often challenging circumstances best understood by local municipal staff and elected officials;

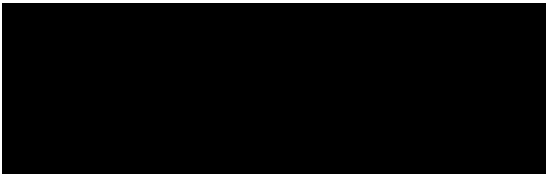




AND WHEREAS the Ontario Amber Alert is a warning system that quickly alerts the public of a suspected abduction of children who are in imminent danger with the goal to broadcast as much information about the child, the abductor and suspect vehicles as quickly as possible so that the public can respond with any relevant information that might lead to the child's safe return;

AND WHEREAS the recent tragic death of 11 year old Draven Graham showed that the Amber Alert system is flawed when it comes to vulnerable children who can go missing but are not abducted;

AND WHEREAS it is clear that there needs to be an addition to the alert system to allow for law enforcement to send out an alert for vulnerable children who go missing under circumstances that do not involve an abduction but are at serious risk of injury or death;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT Council for the Municipality of Port Hope request that the Minister of the Solicitor General and the Commissioner of the Ontario Provincial Police, as well as the Premier's Office, be requested to make the necessary changes to the Amber Alert System and create a new alert called the Draven Alert, which will protect vulnerable children who have not been abducted but are at high risk of danger, injury or death and alert the public that they are missing;

Re: Mandatory Firefighter Certification

The Ontario Government has been making great improvements to the legislation which governs the manner in which municipalities conduct their business. One such piece of legislation is the *Fire Protection and Prevention Act, 1997* and particularly, the requirements for firefighter certification.

While the Town of South Bruce Peninsula supports, in principle, the updates to requirements for volunteer and full-time fire service professionals, we must provide our comments in order for the Province to understand the great burden that the regulations will place on municipalities. Council discussed this issue at their regular Council meeting held on August 2, 2022 and adopted resolution R-296-2022 directing that you are contacted for assistance.

Smaller municipalities such as ours, are not fortunate enough to have full-time firefighters. Our emergency personnel are all volunteers with the exception of our Fire Chief who is a full-time employee and our Deputy Fire Chief who is a part-time employee. It is difficult for our volunteers to dedicate the time to obtaining full certification in the manner legislated, as the fire service is not their primary employment. We have found that the average retention period for volunteers is three to five years meaning that once fully trained, most of our volunteers would leave the service or may even leave the service before they are fully trained and certified.

As you can imagine, this places a huge financial burden on our taxpayers as the certification is an additional cost which is funded wholly from the tax base. No grant funding or other financial assistance has been offered from the Province.

We are under the understanding that the Association of Municipalities of Ontario, many municipal governments and the Fire Chiefs across Ontario have raised concerns regarding the legislated requirements for certification. We are respectfully requesting that meaningful consultation and collaboration with the commenting parties takes place



Re: Kingston City Council Meeting, August 9, 2022 – New Motion 2 – Provincial Support of Community-Based Sexual Assault Centres and Organizations

At the regular meeting on August 9, 2022, Council approved New Motion 2 with respect to provincial support of community-based sexual assault centres and organizations. At the same meeting, the following resolution was approved:

Whereas Sexual Assault Centre Kingston has provided prevention education, advocacy and support for survivors of recent or historical sexual violence in the area since 1978; and

Whereas the number of survivors needing access to crisis counselling and long-term counselling programs has increased since 1978; and

Whereas in 2018, the then-Ontario government announced an approximately 30% increase to the sexual violence sector in Ontario; and

Whereas the 2018 announcement would have realized a significant increase for Ontario's community-based sexual assault centres, and despite this commitment, under the current provincial government, the funding increase never became reality; and

Whereas in its 2021 budget, the Province of Ontario allocated resources to underserved communities to improve victim and new sexual assault services,

however none of the funding was directed to Ontario's existing sexual assault centres such as Sexual Assault Centre Kingston; and

Whereas ongoing underfunding of Sexual Assault Centre Kingston has reduced the number of resources available to provide these services due to highly specialized skill requirements that are unmatched by low wages and benefits relative to other mental health funded positions; and

Whereas the current COVID-19 pandemic has resulted in an increase in the number of people in the community requiring the services of Sexual Assault Centre Kingston; and

Whereas a similar resolution has recently been passed by the Waterloo Region Municipality (June 2022) and the Town of Bracebridge (Dec 2021);

Therefore Be It Resolved That increased and sustainable provincial funding for the Sexual Assault Centre Kingston and other community-based sexual assault centres/organizations be supported for priority consideration by the Provincial Government and its agencies; and

That a copy of this resolution be sent to the Association of Municipalities of Ontario, Ontario municipalities with populations over 50,000, Hon. Merrilee Fullerton, Minister of Children, Community, and Social Services and Hon. Ted Hsu, MPP for Kingston and the Islands.



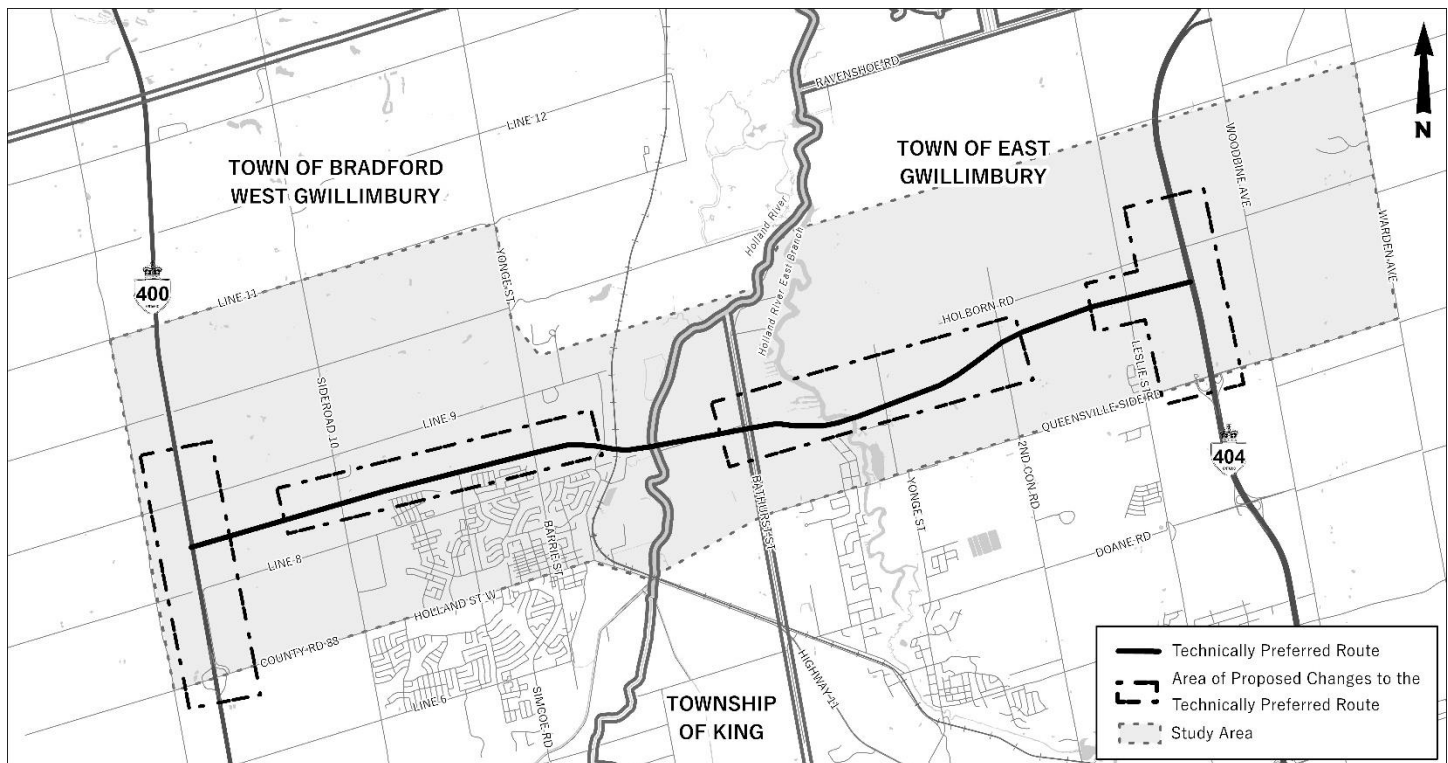
THE STUDY

The Ministry of Transportation has retained AECOM Canada Ltd. to undertake a Preliminary Design and project-specific assessment of environmental impacts in accordance with Ontario Regulation 697/21 for the Bradford Bypass. Under the regulation, the study is following the streamlined assessment process that includes environmental commitments from the 2002 Approved Environmental Assessment for preliminary design of the Technically Preferred Route.

The Bradford Bypass will be a 16.2 kilometre, controlled access freeway to connect Highway 400 and Highway 404 with proposed full and partial interchanges, and grade separated crossings. The route extends from Highway 400 between 8th Line and 9th Line in Bradford West Gwillimbury (County of Simcoe), will cross a small portion of King Township, and will connect to Highway 404 between Queensville Sideroad and Holborn Road in East Gwillimbury (Regional Municipality of York).

The current study proposes preliminary design refinements to the route alignment and interchanges, design standard updates to the freeway interchanges, and grade separated crossings at local roads and watercourses, including new bridges over the Holland River and Holland River East Branch. This project will also include design integration with planned work on Highway 400, such as the design development for the replacement of the 9th Line structure on Highway 400.

The key map shows the study area, the Technically Preferred Route, as well as areas where changes are proposed to the Technically Preferred Route. Alternatives and refinements have been generated that are currently being evaluated within the study area.





BACKGROUND



Terry's Story

- Terry Fox was diagnosed with osteogenic sarcoma (bone cancer) in his right leg in 1977 and had his right leg amputated 15 cm above the knee
- While in the hospital, Terry was so overcome by the suffering of other cancer patients that he decided to run across Canada to raise money for cancer research and he called his journey the *Marathon of Hope*
- Terry's *Marathon of Hope* took place in 1980 with the simple objective of informing Canadians of the importance of finding a cure for cancer
- With fierce determination, he ran an average of 42 kilometres every day for 143 days
- Terry was forced to end his run on September 1, 1980 when the cancer spread to his lungs
- By February 1, 1981, Terry's dream of raising \$1 for every Canadian was realized—the Terry Fox *Marathon of Hope* fund totaled \$24.17 million
- Terry died in June 28, 1981

The Terry Fox Foundation

- On May 26, 1988, the Terry Fox Run became a Trust, independent from the Canadian Cancer Society, as a registered public foundation
- The Terry Fox Foundation (TFF) is a leading national charitable organization that honours the vision and spirit of an iconic Canadian
- As one of Canada's largest charities in cancer research, we pride ourselves on significant investments in translational research
- Established in 2007, the Terry Fox Research Institute (TFRI) invests in world-class scientific and clinical research that accelerates discoveries for cancer patients and their families
- With support from partners across the country, TFRI is expanding its research portfolio to include two innovative projects that will unite our country and improve the lives of cancer patients through precision medicine: the Marathon of Hope Cancer Centres Network and the Digital Health and Discovery Platform

Terry Fox Run

- The Terry Fox Run takes place across Canada on **Sunday, September 18, 2022**
- The Terry Fox School Run takes place nationally on **Friday, September 23, 2022**
- Now in its 42nd year, the Terry Fox Run has evolved into the largest fundraising event in support of cancer research in the world, with events taking place in 33 countries across five continents annually—over 10,000 in Canada
- All runs are non-competitive, all inclusive, family-oriented activities where participants can run, walk, ride, or wheel
